The Plight of Children in Sierra Leone

Among them, some are forced to eke out an existence on the unforgiving streets with their families, while others spend their days begging for a meager sustenance. Tragically, nights often find them without shelter, left to endure the elements in market stalls, unfinished buildings, or on the wayside.

Empowering Girls through Menstrual Health Education and Access

World Menstrual Hygiene Day

World Menstrual Hygiene Day, observed on May 28th annually since 2014, aims to raise awareness about menstrual hygiene, eliminate stigma, and promote access to menstrual products and facilities. It advocates for education and empowerment, ensuring that women and girls can manage menstruation with dignity and confidence.

Women and girls with disabilities face a multitude of challenges during menstruation that often go overlooked. It is imperative that we advocate on their behalf to ensure they have equal access to accessible water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) facilities in public places and affordable menstrual products.

Offering Dignity and Hope to Women and girls that are visually impaired at the Milton Margai School for the Blind _ Freetown:

On the 27th May, Shalom Rescue Foundation organized a workshop for students residing at the Milton Margai School for the Blind at Wilkinson Road, Freetown. With support from the Mental Health Coalition, SLUDI, and our patrons, we were able to have addressed the needs of those in attendance on issues relating to health, menstruation and hygiene.

Ms. Paulina Kargbo – a trained medical practitioner from the 34 Military facilitated an all-girls session. Some of the areas of discuss were centered on addressing issues that affects women and girls with disabilities during their menstrual cycle. Amongst such issues are: Inaccessible WASH Facilities in public places, Stigma and Discrimination, Limited Access to Information, and access to affordable menstrual products.



Restoring Dignity and Hope to women and girls with our Dignity Package

Girls were able to interact amongst themselves by sharing experiences and asking questions.

Our Dignity Package:

At the end of the program our Dignity Packages were distributed to all present. Each package contains: Sanitary Pads, soap, shaving sticks, sanitary towels, deodorants, and gift bag.

In attendance were representatives from: Mental Health Coalition Sierra Leone, Principal and Matron of Milton Margai School for the Blind - Freetown, Counselling and Psychosocial Unit Connaught Hospital, Patrons, volunteers, Redeemer Radio Network, and staff of Shalom Rescue Foundation.

Making Menstruation a Normal Fact of life by 2030

Menstruation, a natural and essential aspect of a woman's reproductive health, has been historically stigmatized and often viewed as a taboo topic in many societies worldwide. However, the movement to normalize menstruation has gained momentum in recent years. Shalom Rescue Foundation is part of the Global campaign which aims at ensuring that by the year 2030, menstruation should be seen as a normal and natural fact of life, free from stigma, discrimination, and misinformation. Achieving this vision requires comprehensive efforts on multiple fronts, from education and awareness campaigns to policy changes and cultural shifts.

WEEK OF ACTION

We organized a week-long activity, which centers on the following areas:

<u>Education and Awareness - Comprehensive Menstrual Education:</u> Our staffs and volunteers visited eight schools and other communities during the week of action. Our main task was to dispel myths and misconceptions surrounding menstruation by providing the right information. We encourage open and age-appropriate discussions about menstruation within the families and communities. Create safe spaces where individuals can ask questions and seek guidance without shame or embarrassment.

<u>Engaging Men and Boys:</u> We also promoted the active involvement of men and boys in conversations about menstruation. By breaking down barriers and stereotypes, we can foster more supportive and empathetic communities.

<u>Community-led initiatives:</u> We encourage local communities to take ownership of initiatives that destignatize menstruation, ensuring they are culturally sensitive and inclusive.

Normalizing menstruation by 203: This is an ambitious but achievable goal. It requires a multi-dimensional approach involving education, policy changes, community engagement, and global cooperation.

By working together, we can ensure that menstruation is celebrated as a natural and essential part of life, free from stigma, discrimination, and misinformation. This shift will contribute to gender equality, improved health outcomes, and a more inclusive society for all.
